
I wish the selected team the very best to do well at the qualifiers at Tokyo from May 04th to 07th.

Army Rowing Node (ARN) was raised in the year 2001 on the banks of River Mula which runs across Pune City of Maharashtra State. ARN was raised under the aegis of Mission Olympics Wing of the Indian Army with an aim to win an Olympic Medal for the Country. This is the only international standard, man-made rowing channel ever constructed in India in the year 2009 by the Corps of Engineers of Indian Army along with Defence Research & Development Organisation (DRDO).

Beginning from rowers' selection into ARN till their peak performance, each rower of ARN is trained by imparting quality training using scientific methodologies and best out of the best are scouted to represent India. Data and progress cards of every rower is maintained and analysed frequently. All rowers are counselled by the training team regularly and improvements are suggested if required.

ARN has successfully conducted three National Rowing events. Currently three National Coaching Camps for preparation and training of Indian Rowing Teams are under progress at ARN. These teams are scheduled to participate in the following Rowing Events:

- FISA Asia & Oceania Olympic Qualification Regatta, 2021.
- 20th Asian Rowing Championship, 2021.
- Paralympic Olympic Qualification Regatta, 2021.

KNOW YOUR COACH

G.S NAIR in conversation with Atiriya Dasgupta



From an international swimmer with unbroken swimming records to rowing coach who produced record-breaking rowers, G.S Nair is a man of great adaptability and perseverance.

G. S Nair started his sports career as a swimmer and had made quite a mark by winning a silver and bronze in Asian Swimming Championship in 1980 and had created national records which remained unbreakable for several years. G.S Nair was introduced to the sport rowing in 1989 when the SAI Alleppey camp was first established. He was trained to be an expert coach by the then Olympians, World Cup winners and foreign coaches who had come to India to train the rowers. Later, he completed his FISA level course in 1992 at Kolkata and FISA Coaching Academy Course in 1999 in Banyoles, Spain. He was highly influenced by the foreign coaches which pushed him to be the excellent coach he was. Initially, he was facing difficulty in adapting to the sport which was completely unknown to him, but with dedication and hardwork, he proved himself to be a great coach.

With him as the State Coach, Kerala started acing the National Championships and in 1993 the Kerala State Rowing team won the overall championship. Under him rowers such as Dittymol Varghese, Jincymol Varghese, Thara Kurian have trained who have kept the tricolour flying high in the international championships. Among all the races he has experienced, his favourite memory is of Jincymol Varghese winning bronze in IX Asian Rowing Championships in 2001.

G.S Nair's Mantra to Pre-race Jitters

He believes in listening carefully to the pep-talk the coaches impart before the race and to have confidence in oneself. To have the Indian jersey on one's back and bring laurels for the country, it requires complete willingness to work hard and insane level of dedication. Complete faith in the coach and physical and mental preparation must also be there to achieve the goal.

G.S Nair has shaped the base of international India Rowing over the years and has created the role models who inspire the budding rowers to achieve what they think is impossible. Little light was shed upon India rowing pre-2000 but with G.S Nair's help, a lot is known about the time when role models were themselves training to be the best among the best.









KNOW YOUR ROWER

IKHUSHPREET KAUR

When 21 years old Khushpreet Kaur took off her running shoes and took up the oars, she did not even have the faintest thought that one day, she would be bringing laurels for her country in rowing.

Originally hailing from Bathinda, Punjab, Khushpreet was originally a state-level athlete. Upon taking part in a Talent Hunt Camp, she got spotted by the rowing coaches and she got shifted to Bhopal for her rowing training.

She started turning heads by clinching the bronze medal in the single sculls category at her first Senior Nationals held at Hussain Sagar in 2019.

Within a couple of years, Khushpreet Kaur struck double golds in the Asian Continental Qualifiers 2021 for World Indoor Rowing Championships in the U-23 2000m and 500m category.

In the World Indoor Rowing Championships, she secured the 11th position in the U-23 500m category with a timing of 1:41.1 minutes.

Upon being asked about how she felt after the race, she replied that she felt extremely elated and was on literally cloud nine. Her coach, Dalvir Singh was extremely satisfied with her performance and proud of her. Khushpreet was the only rower from the Bhopal camp to partake in the championships.

Amidst the gruelling pandemic, when the world was gradually acclimatizing to the destructive ways of the pandemic, Khushpreet was already well ahead in her game and was practising with a burning passion to have the tricolour printed on her jersey.

Her day began at 5:00 am and her morning practice sessions began at 6:00 am in the morning and continued till 10:30 am. Again, it resumed from 4:30 pm in the evening and continued till 6:00 pm.

She travelled from the Academy hostel which is about a kilometer or so from the practice venue by the bus provided by the academy. Her diligence and sincerity during training sessions along with her zeal to win made her dream come true.

Khushpreet is now training for the Olympic trials and dearly hopes to qualify as the first female Olympian rower in India. Khushpreet Kaur has set the benchmark of achieving her goals in such less time. Her sincerity, confidence and integrity made up for the lack of experience in rowing and has become a new role model for the up-and-coming rowers of the country.













INDOOR ASIAN QUALIFIER

ASIAN CONTINENTAL QUALIFIER FOR THE WORLD ROWING INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP 2021

With entries open for all age groups ranging from Juniors to Super Masters, the Asian Continental Qualifier for the WRICH was held on January. 24th and saw a huge participation from across the continent. The Qualifier hosted both the 2Km and 500 metre events and served as a qualification round to the World Rowing Indoor Championship finals.

India secured a total of 13 medals at the event, of which 8 were Gold. All the medal winners automatically qualified to compete at the WRICH event. Apart from the medal winners a few other rowers who made the qualifying time also got to qualify for the WRICH event.



The challenge at hand however is the classification of the newer athletes. This is important because each Para Rower must be systematically classified by FISA in order to compete. The classification is based on the disability level of athletes, so those with similar levels of Physical ability can be paired together to fairly compete.

While our teams compete for spots at the Tokyo Games, via the Asian & Oceania Continental Qualifier in May. this will also serve as an opportunity to have our newer athletes certified. This is because rules mandate certification may only be done by certified personnel at specified FISA event venues.

We wish our team the very best of luck, in the run up to the Qualifier Regatta.

WORLD ROWN INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP

IN THE FIRST VIRTUAL WORLD INDOOR ROWING CHAMPIONSHIP EVENT HELD, 63 COUNTRIES PARTICIPATED WITH 935 QUALIFIED ATHLETES.

A total of 54 events were held, with participant classes ranging from the U-19, U-23 to the Super Masters' category.

Instead of rowing in a centralized location World Rowing beamed screens with dozens of cameras streaming live from gymnasiums, clubs and even bedrooms.

We had some exceptional results with Parminder Singh, an Asian Indoor record holder, placing 6th in

Ashish Phugat finished 6th in the U-23 Light Weight Men's 500-meter race, while Tarun Gutta and Sanjay Jain finished 10th place in their respective events, the former being the U-23 500-meter event, whereas the latter was a Mater's rower in the 55-59 years, 2000m event. All our other athletes too finished within the top 18 places globally.

ROAD TO TOKYO

With Olympic Qualification Regatta, slated to be held in the first week of May at Tokyo's, Sea Forest Waterway, the final selection trials at the National Olympic Camps were concluded in the second week of March, 2021.

The Regatta will have, around 100 participants from 25 countries, competing. RFI will have 7 athletes participating, battling it out for 5 potential spots for team India at the Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Jakar Khan will be competing in the Men's Single Scull, while Arjun Jat and Arvind Singh will be in the Light Weight Double Sculls event. Khushpreet Kaur will be fighting it out for the Women's Open Single, while Vindhya Sankat and Rukmani Dangi will be in the race for the Women's Light Weight Double Sculls. Sunil Attri and Sona Keer will be reserve rowers for the Men's and Women's team respectively.

Wing Commander, Shantanu, will be in the ring for the PR1 Single Sculls event. The team will be led, by National Coach Ismail Baig, Women's Coach, Dalvir Singh Rathore and Mohammad Azad, Para Rowing Coach. The team will also be accompanied by a 2-member support staff.
